Biniker, talented siblings, will perform on the main floor of the library on Friday evening, April 27, at 7 p.m.




L-R, Samantha, Alex and Nicholas Biniker.

#### Clint Mauk to speak on 'Heroes: Wayne, Harrison, Perry' April 17

Fallen Timbers, Fort Meigs and Lake Erie are arguably among the most important battles ever fought on U.S. soil against a foreign enemy. And they happened right here in northwest Ohio.

Perrysburg resident Clint Mauk will bring to life the heroes of these three battles—General Anthony Wayne, William Henry Harrison, and Commodore Oliver Hazard Perry—in a special talk on Tuesday, April 17, on the lower level of the library.

This event, part of the library's

celebration of National Library Week, is free, and refreshments will be served.

Clint Mauk, a life-long resident of Wood County, is a graduate of Dartmouth College. A retired lumberman and banker, Mr. Mauk has been a Toledo Rotarian for more than 50 years. His "Historical Tales of Toledo" was a best seller, with all proceeds going to the Rotary Foundation. He is a founder of St. Timothy's Episcopal Church and the Black Swamp Conservancy, and a board member of the 577 Foundation, the Toledo Symphony, and Historic Perrysburg.

Along with fly fishing, organic gardening and golf, Mr. Mauk's hobbies include local history. He has lectured to 140+ groups on NW Ohio history.

#### Foundation Mystery Play raises \$28,000 for Endowment, library programs




