A junior at Bowling Green High School, Anne played solos with the Toledo Symphony Orchestra and the Toledo Youth Orchestra this year. She won first place in the OFMC Agnes Fowler Competition. In 2004 she placed second in both the Bluffton College Young Artists Competition and the Heidelberg College Pacesetter Competition. In 2003, she soloed with the Prague Radio Symphony on tour in Europe.

Anne is now a member of the Cleveland Orchestra Youth Orchestra. In 2004 she was principal flute of the OMEA Northwest Regional Orchestra; in January she will play with the OMEA All-State Band. The daughter of William and Emily Lake, Anne also plays piano, hand bell and violin. She is concertmaster of the BGHS Orchestra. She hopes to win a position as a flutist in a major symphony orchestra in the future.

Violinist **Sarah Connelly**, a Perrysburg resident and former library employee, will open what we hope will be another exciting year of Young Artist Recitals at the library. Sarah will perform on Sunday, January 29, at 3 p.m. A 2004 Perrysburg High School graduate, Sarah is a violin performance major at Bowling Green State State University. A Toledo Youth Orchestra soloist in 2004, Sarah's goal is to attain a master's degree in



violin performance and join a traveling performance ensemble. She is the daughter of Robert and Lisa Connelly of Perrysburg.

Sarah studied this past July at the Ionian Summer Music Academy in Greece. A member of the Perrysburg Symphony, she teaches violin and plays in church and theater orchestras. At BGSU she is active in student government as a music representative.
