Noted genealogist Lolita Guthrie to talk on 'Researching Your Family: Getting Started'



Way Library and Historic Perrysburg, Inc., are pleased to present Lolita Guthrie, well-known genealogist and cemetery preservationist, in a Tuesday, February 20, program beginning at 7 p.m. on the lower level of the library. This program is free, and refreshments will be served.

Mrs. Guthrie will speak on "Researching Your Family: Getting

Started." She will share her passion for family history as well as many valuable techniques for beginning a search for your family roots.

In 2006 Mrs. Guthrie was recognized on the national level as the recipient of the third annual Ruth C. Bishop Volunteer Hall of Honor Award. Nominated by the Ohio Genealogical Society (OGS), Mrs. Guthrie was inducted into the Volunteer Hall of Honor at the Federation of Genealogical Societies' Annual Conference in Boston.

She is currently president and projects coordinator of the Wood County Genealogical Society Chapter. She has been a long-time chair of the OGS Cemetery Committee. From 1993 to 2005 she served as a member of the OGS Board of Trustees, and in 2006 was named an OGS Fellow for her special projects, volunteer work and skill in accomplishing goals for the society.

AARP tax help starts February 5

For more than 25 years, Way Library has hosted the AARP Tax-Aide Program. This year the weekly program of tax preparation for seniors and low/medium-income individuals and families begins February 5.

Thanks to assistance from the AARP Foundation and the IRS, the library site will have computers installed with IRS Tax-Wise software for use by the 10 Perrysburg volunteers.

As in the past, persons seeking this free service should telephone the library, 419-874-3135 and press "2", for an appointment. Taxpayers will be asked to fill in an information sheet when they arrive for their appointment. You are asked to bring your social security card and, if new to the site, photo identification, as well as copies of 2006 tax returns and all W-2s, 1099s and any other income forms and records of deductible expenditures (medical, taxes, interest, contributions, etc.) if you itemize deductions.
