Way Library's Topical Tuesday Series starts off the new year with a look at the economy and how it may fare in 2011. On Tuesday, January 18, at 7 p.m., **Dr. Candace Archer**, associate professor in the Department of Political Science at Bowling Green State University, will speak on "The Sub-Prime Crisis: Did the Bailouts Help?" Dr. Archer will assess the results of the massive infusion of taxpayer money into the banks and insurance companies during the 2008-09 economic crisis.

Dr. Archer received her PhD in political science from the University of Delaware in 2003. Her research at BGSU centers on the international political economy including global financial crises and international financial organizations such as the International Monetary Fund.
