## WAY, HISTORIC PERRYSBURG HOST FITZGERALD EVENT

Historic Perrysburg, Inc., and Way Public Library are pleased to jointly present a commemoration program on the sinking of the **Edmund Fitzgerald**. This special event marking the 30th anniversary year of the Nov. 10, 1975, wreck will be held at the library on **Wednesday, March 23**, at 7 p.m. This program is free and open to the public, but because of limited seating we are asking anyone who wishes to attend to register on our website: [www.waylibrary.info](http://www.waylibrary.info), beginning March 7.

The speakers at the 7 p.m. meeting will be Jene Quirin and Larry Elliott, board members of the Great Lakes Shipwreck Historical Society who not only are well versed in the history and lore surrounding the wreck but who both have personal experience diving and photographing the remains of the ship in Lake Superior off Whitefish Point.

In conjunction with this event, the library is videotaping reminiscences of area residents who were directly or indirectly affected by this tragedy. One participant will be Tom Walton, editor of *The Blade*, whose uncle perished in the mysterious sinking and who was himself a crew member of the *Fitzgerald* during a break from college.

## Youth program to be part of March 23 event

Young people may have heard Gordon Lightfoot's hauntingly beautiful ballad on the sinking of the *Edmund Fitzgerald*.

At 4 p.m. on Wednesday, March 23, young adults can hear the song, see a video depiction of the tragedy, and hear an abbreviated rendition of the same presentation which Gene Quirin and Larry Elliott will give to an adult audience later in the day.

In conjunction with the evening program [see above] sponsored by the library and Historic Perrysburg, Way will offer this unique opportunity for young people to learn about the sad events of November 10, 1975, as well as recent efforts to locate the sunken freighter and raise its historic bell.

The program designed for students grades 5-8 is free of charge, and there is no advance registration.

Library Director Nancy Kelley will be discussing the impact of Governor Taft's new budget on libraries. Beginning in Jan. 2006 and continuing from 2007, public library funding will be reduced 5%. A proposed 21% cut in personal income tax may negatively impact libraries in years to come.

## Genealogy workshops in April



# Your Way Public Library: a busy place for busy people

Way Library showed increases in circulation across the board in 2004. Adult circulation was up 5 percent from 2003, and juvenile circulation rose 7.2 percent. DVDs and videos continue to contribute to total circulation statistics, with AV materials about one-third of the total circulation. [See graph at right.] Posting large increases were classic DVDs, foreign DVDs, children’s feature and non-fiction DVDs. Videos are less in demand, due to changes in technology.

The **SEO Consortium**, of which Way is a member, has broken new ground in annual circulation statistics, 11,830,460 in 2004, up 5.1% from 2003. There was an 18.6 percent increase in holds and a whopping 87.4% increase in self-renewals, thanks to the iPac system. Managing your own account is great for busy people, and librarians here at Way will help you get started...just ask!
