

Operating levy on August ballot reflects state funding changes

Perrysburg City Council has passed a resolution to proceed with the placement of a Way Library operating levy on the August 5, 2008, ballot. Although the library receives no funding from the City of Perrysburg, the City is the library's taxing authority. The library's current 1.0-mill operating levy expires at the end of this year.

The Wood County Board of Elections certified the resolution, which states the necessity of requesting a four-year replacement of the library's existing 1.0-mill levy with an increase of 0.5 mills for current expenses.

This levy request reflects the continuing erosion of state funding for Ohio libraries. In the March 2008 primary, 14 Ohio public libraries turned to the voters for levy support; 12 of these operating issues were successful.

materials budget and eliminating free use of library meeting rooms. After passing our operating levy, we have been able to restore these services but have taken a cautious approach to technology acquisition and building the collection. On average, staff salaries have increased 2-3% annually. To satisfy new state/federal mandates, salaries of staff members making the minimum wage have increased accordingly. A conservative budget is projected for the

the future. The new levy request takes into consideration the continued uncertainty in state funding.

If approved by the voters, this levy will raise \$860,410 annually for four years, providing approximately 39% of the library's income. Currently the owner of a \$100,000 house pays \$31.00 per year; with the new levy, this will increase to \$46.00 per year (with a homestead exemption, \$34.00/year).

St. Luke's series May 14: robotic surgery

Gynecologist Jonathan Detrick, MD, and urogynecologist Andrew Croak, DO, will be guest presenters at the next Way Library -St. Luke's Hospital Health Lecture. On Wednesday, May 14, at 7 p.m., these area physicians will speak on "The da Vinci S HD Surgical System: The Benefits of Robotic Surgery."

The word 'robot' may conjure up the world of science fiction. But, surgeons are finding that real-life robots are especially helpful in minimally invasive surgery. Surgeons at St. Luke's Hospital are using the da Vinci S DH surgical system for gynecological procedures such as hysterectomies. Women who undergo this type of hysterectomy are back to a normal routine in about two weeks. Along with urological procedures, the da Vinci soon will help with cardiac and colorectal surgery.

<u>'Testing the Saturday Night Live Hypothesis':</u> BGSU researchers share media bias study results here May 20

Dr. Melissa Miller, Bowling Green State University assistant professor of political science, and Dr. Jeffrey Peake, BGSU associate professor of political science, will present the next Topical Tuesdays program at the library on Tuesday, May 20, at 7 p.m. Their intriguing topic: "Testing the Satur-

day Night Live Hypothesis: Preliminary Findings on Hillary Clinton's Press Coverage."

Based on the preliminary findings of their largescale study of press coverage of all the presidential candidates, Dr. Miller and Dr. Peake will address Hillary Clinton's contention that the media's coverage of her campaign has been more negative than that of her competitors. During a televised debate with Barack Obama, she referred to the Saturday Night Live spoof: "Ask Barack if he's comfortable and needs another pillow." Has her coverage really been biased, less issue oriented, more negative?



These BGSU researchers studied campaign-related articles in 27 newspapers Jeffrey Peake from across the country, content coding them to gauge the relative amount of coverage for each candidate, its content, its substance and its tone (negative, positive, neutral). Supported by a grant from the Center for Research Libraries and grants from the BGSU Office of Sponsored Programs and Research and the Department

of Political Science, this research will allow Dr. Miller and Dr. Peake to "test the Saturday Night Live hypothesis." Join us to hear their informed conclusions!

Afghanistan, Pakistan, Iraq: what is the real war on terror? Afghani/Mideast scholar, a Maumee native, to speak June 26



Thomas E. Gouttierre, a 1958 graduate of Maumee High School who is Dean of International Studies and Programs and Director of the Center for Afghanistan Studies at the University of Nebraska at Omaha, will speak at Way Library on Thursday, June 26, at 7 p.m. Admission is free, and refreshments will be served.

Dr. Gouttierre will speak on "Afghanistan, Pakistan, Iraq: What is the Real War on Terror? This presentation is intended to focus attention on the three "hot spots" of global tension/warfare and examine these conflicts with respect to the issue of international terrorism.

The recipient of an honorary doctorate and Distinguished Alumnus Award from BGSU, Mr. Gouttierre lived and worked in Afghanistan for 10 years, serving as a Peace Corps volunteer, a Fulbright Fellow and executive director of the Fulbright Foundation. He also coached the Afghan National Basketball Team.

After assuming his position at UNO in 1974, he has served as a UN peacekeeper, a Fulbright ambassador, and as a member of the International Rescue Committee's Citizens Commission on Afghanistan Refugees. He has testified before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and House of Representatives committee on International Relations. He has written books and spoken extensively on topics related to the Mideast.
