With support from our friends at O-I, the library has planned many events and programs to keep everyone involved — and reading! — over the summer months. This issue will focus on the programs for young people. The "summer" edition of the newsletter will feature our adult summer program.

An important part of our Youth Services' efforts in the summer involves the **Summer Reading Club**. Children may visit the library once each week and write down the books they have

read on their reading logs. They will receive a small prize and a sticker on the log. Six stickers will be issued the weeks of June 8 through July 13. During "makeup week" (July 20-25) children collect stickers and prizes

they have missed. Preschoolers may participate by having books read to them.

Claire's Day is a family book festival held annually in memory of Claire Lynsey Rubini; its purpose is to inspire children to be lifelong readers through exposure to various literary experiences.

Having won more than 30 major awards for his books, Mr. Soentpiet is known for meticulous historical research which enables him to create works that are detailed, culturally rich, and painstakingly accurate.
