LIBRARY'S ROLE AS COMMUNITY CENTER GROWS

In 2004, we began several new programs to widen the base of people who regularly use the library, including an art/foreign film series, ReelArt@Way; a PBS Program Club co-sponsored by WBGU-TV, and genealogy workshops.

Sundays provide new opportunities for programming. **Sunday Sounds at Way** with live music by Perrysburg Symphony Orchestra musicians premiered in September. Watch for a oboe duo on November 21 and the Academy Brass Quintet on December 12. Enjoy the sounds of great classical music while you rediscover the joys of spending Sunday afternoon surrounded by good books at Way.

We also have some good old-fashioned fun in store for you, with plans in the works for a **Laugh-In** on a Sunday afternoon in January. Perrysburg High School students from The Cellar will show their creative, awardwinning videos to an audience desperate for some relief from the gloomy winter weather we are certain to experience by then.

Another new program planned for Sunday afternoons is a **Parent-Child Book Discussion Group**. Watch for more details in next month's newsletter. Tentative plans are for a discussion open to children in grades 3 -5 (ages 8-11) and one parent or adult reading companion. Three different books will be discussed on January 30, February 27 and April 1 at 2 p.m.

All these upcoming programs will be featured in future newsletter issues .
