OHIO HUMANITIES GRANT SUPPORTS BRINKLEY TALK


Way Library is pleased to announce major financial support from the Ohio Humanities Council for our December 7 author talk by historian Douglas Brinkley. This event co-sponsored by the Perrysburg Schools and Historic Perrysburg, Inc., is the culmination of the library's 125th anniversary celebration.



A 1978 graduate of Perrysburg High School, Dr. Brinkley is now director of the Theodore Roosevelt Center for American Civilization and Professor of History at Tulane University. Dr. Brinkley will sign copies of "The Great

Deluge," his recent best-seller about Hurricane Katrina, after his talk which will take place at Perrysburg Junior High School at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, December 7. Along with visiting Perrysburg High School and meeting with students, Dr. Brinkley will be the honored guest at an afternoon reception at the library.

This event will be free of charge, thanks to the generous grant from the Ohio Humanities Council and financial assistance from our co-sponsors as well as the Foundation and the Friends of Way Library.

Topical Tuesdays: Phineas Anderson on nuclear terrorism Nov. 14

Phineas Anderson, recently retired head of Maumee Valley Country Day, will speak as part of the Topical Tuesdays discussion series on Tuesday, November 14, at 7 p.m. His topic is "Nuclear Terrorism: the Threat, Our Vulnerability, and How to Stop It."

Along with 41 years in public and private education, Mr. Anderson has served as director of fire policy, research and development at FEMA in Washington, D.C., focusing on organized crime related to arson matters. Mr. Anderson has written 15 Saturday essays for The Blade. He is president of the Rotary Club of Toledo. While traveling to 100 countries, Mr. Anderson has made first ascents in the Andes and participated in national track and field competitions.



Mr. Anderson has studied issues related to nuclear weapons for more than 20 years. In his talk on November 14 he will touch upon Weapons of Mass Destruction but focus on the possibility that a nuclear bomb could be set off by stateless terrorists within the next seven years. He will address preventative measures to be taken.
