- The "Traveling Clothesline and Silent Witness Project" will be on display outside the main doors of the library on Wednesday, October 8, from 11 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. Victim Services of Behavioral Connections is sponsoring the visual display bearing witness to violence against women, in honor of domestic violence awareness month (October). This powerful statement includes shirts designed by domestic violence survivors and lifesized wooden silhouettes representing Wood County women whose lives ended violently at the hands of husbands, boyfriends or dating partners. There have been more than 50 such murders in northwest Ohio in the past decade. This exhibit honors Carol Geringer and Linda Lambert.

Below is a slightly condensed version of a letter sent to Perrysburg Rotary. We are proud of our world-class reputation!

Dear Rotary Club of Perrysburg,

Hello and greetings from India. I am Architect Priya Gokhale and a member of the team that came to Perrysburg from Pune as part of the Group Study Exchange program between Dist. 6600 and Dist. 3130. We were in Perrysburg from 27 April to 3 May, our first destination before proceeding to other towns.

I am a practicing architect and editor of a prominent design magazine. I stay in my city Pune with husband Dr. Abhijit who is a surgeon and urologist, son Pranav, 11, and my husband's parents, both doctors. Our city is a vibrant place, having a nice mix of commerce, recreation and huge development in IT and manufacturing.

The trip to USA in general and Perrysburg in particular has been the high points of my career so far. I have learned and absorbed much during my stay there. While on the personal front, I made friends for a lifetime, on the professional front, I gained an entirely new and wonderful insight into how this great country of yours works and why it is a magnet for people all over the world.

I was exposed to a major portion of the USA, since, after our Perrysburg sojourn, we travelled all over Ohio, then to Baltimore, Washington DC, Virginia, the West Coast (Disneyland, Las Vegas, San Francisco), and on to Indianapolis and Chicago. So, it has been an eventful 45-day trip that comes back many times to my mind.

In all my travels in USA and in my country, I cannot help but admire the Way Library. For a town like Perrysburg to have such an asset in the community is something that has to be seen to be believed, as I myself told so many people at home. The library has everything - what a wonderful gift it is to the town!! Not only is it an important Interactive area for the entire people, but also a treasure house of information and therefore, a building that forms the soul of the town. I am so grateful for being given a chance to see it inside out. It has stood out in my memory as one of the most inspiring and pleasant places, especially when I learned that it has been remodeled after the original building and retains the same ethos and feel. We are thinking of featuring the library as a model unit for a town library in the next issue of our book, an issue dedicated to Public Buildings.
