WAY 1.5-MILL OPERATING LEVY ON AUG. 5 BALLOT

At the special election slated for Tuesday, August 5, Perrysburg city voters will be asked to pass a 1.5-mill, fouryear operating levy in support of Way Public Library. This levy will replace the library's existing 1-mill levy which will expire on December 31, 2008.

Currently the levy provides approximately 29% (\$534,440) of the library's \$1,817,706 operating budget. In anticipation of decreased state funding for Ohio libraries, as well as increased costs for utilities, building maintenance, personnel, collection materials and technology, the Way library board decided to ask voters for an additional half-mill which will provide an extra \$325,969 over the next four-year period.

This levy will cost the owner of a \$100,000 home \$46.00 per year. If you are a senior with a homestead exemption, the cost will be \$34.00 per year.

Those of you who know and appreciate the many roles Way Library plays in our community will understand the importance of this levy. With its proceeds we will:

- Preserve the safety and integrity of our heavily used facility. Staffing and funds for repairs, maintenance, cleaning and service agreements are critical to the future of the library.
- Maintain existing library hours. We are open 67 hours per week, Labor Day to Memorial Day, and 63 hours per week in the summer.
- Provide necessary resources for the Circulation and Reference departments due to increased activity. Increases in circulation will necessitate increased bandwidth for circulation procedures and interlibrary loan upgrades. >>Continued on p. 2

- Stay current with today's technology and training to meet the growing needs of our patrons. Our public computers had more than 4,000 log-ons last month alone. Our computer classes are free or almost free. Our technology plan ensures staggered replacement of computers so that we remain up-to-date in hardware & software.
- Continue to provide free programs and special events for the community. As a community hub, Way has increased its programs from 174 in 2002 to 537 in 2007.
- Maintain current policies on meeting room usage including free use by non-profits.
- Increase services to our young adult (ages 11-14) population. Way's past two strategic plans have pointed to the importance of additional services for this age group. Perrysburg Junior High has expressed concern about reading scores, and we would like to support efforts to help young people become life-long readers. An experienced young adult librarian will be hired.
- Maintain our vast collection: books, audiobooks, downloadable e -books, DVDs, music CDs. Costs of these items constantly increase. Should the levy fail, all materials budgets will be cut 30-50%.



Public reception, art display to honor L. Paul Baldoni, M.D. (1929-2007)

Way Public Library will hold a photographic exhibit and reception honoring the memory of long-time Perrysburg physician L. Paul Baldoni. An exhibit of Dr. Baldoni's prize-winning photographs will open July 7 on the lower level of the library. A reception featuring a performance by young singer Elise Matney is scheduled for Wednesday, July 16, at 7 p.m. The exhibit and reception are free and open to the public.

Dr. Paul Baldoni, a beloved family doctor who was also a talented photographer and music devotee, was an enthusiastic advocate for Way Public Library. As president of the library board, he helped to arrange the land purchase for an expanded library facility. The extensive opera collection of Dr. Baldoni now belongs to the library and soon will be available for circulation to all patrons. The board will dedicate a section of the library in his memory and possibly offer an annual operatic concert.

This project will be supported by funds derived from the sale of Dr. Baldoni's photographs. They will be displayed July 7 through August 2 in the gallery on the lower level of the library.

At the July 16 reception, Elise Matney will sing a selection of arias, the photographs will be on display, and refreshments will be served.

Passport Fair on July 15

The Way Library-Perrysburg Post Office Passport Fair will be held Tuesday, July 15, from 4 to 8 p.m. on the lower level.

To obtain a passport for the first time, applicants must apply in person with two photographs, proof of U.S. citizenship and a valid form of photo identification such as a driver's license. To expedite processing, you may download an application from the Department of State website and bring the completed form with you.

Call the Post Office for fees/rules. Passport photos will be taken in the library at the Fair for a fee of \$15. The Department of State says that passport processing is currently taking less than four weeks.
